
Pope Francis' Catechesis on the Mass—The Eucharistic Prayer (Part I)

We continue the catechesis on Holy Mass and with this catechesis we focus on the *Eucharistic Prayer*. When the rite of the presentation of bread and wine is concluded, the *Eucharistic Prayer* begins, which qualifies the celebration of Mass and constitutes the central moment, ordained to Holy Communion. It corresponds to what Jesus himself did, at the table with the Apostles at the Last Supper, when he "gave thanks" on bread and then on the chalice of wine (cf. *Mt 26,27, Mk 14,23, Lk , 22,17.19; 1 Cor. 11,24*): his thanksgiving lives again in all our Eucharist, associating us with his sacrifice of salvation.

And in this solemn prayer - the Eucharistic Prayer is solemn - the Church expresses what she does when she celebrates the Eucharist and the reason why she celebrates it, that is, to make communion with Christ truly present in the consecrated bread and wine. After inviting the people to raise their hearts to the Lord and to give them thanks, the priest pronounces the Prayer aloud, in the name of all those present, addressing the Father through Jesus Christ in the Holy Spirit. "The meaning of this Prayer is that the whole assembly of the faithful unite with Christ in magnifying the great works of God and in offering the sacrifice" (*General Instruction of the Roman Missal*, 78). And to unite must understand. For this reason, the Church wanted to celebrate Mass in the language that people understand, so that everyone can join this praise and this great prayer with the priest. In truth, "the sacrifice of Christ and the sacrifice of the Eucharist are a single sacrifice" (*Catechism of the Catholic Church*, 1367).

In the Missal there are various formulas of Eucharistic Prayer, all made up of characteristic elements, which I would like to recall now (cf. <u>OGMR</u>, <u>79</u>, CCC, 1352-1354). They are all beautiful. First of all there is the *Preface*, which is an *act of thanksgiving* for God's gifts, especially for sending his Son as Savior. The Preface ends with the *acclamation* of the "Saint", normally sung. It is beautiful to sing the "Saint": "Holy, Holy, Holy the Lord". It's nice to sing it. The whole assembly unites its own voice with that of the Angels and Saints to praise and glorify God.

Then there is the invocation of the Spirit to consecrate bread and wine with his power. We invoke the Spirit to come and in the bread and in the wine there is Jesus. The action of the Holy Spirit and the efficacy of the same words of Christ uttered by the priest make really present, under the species of bread and wine, his Body and his Blood, his sacrifice offered on the cross once and for all (cf. CCC, 1375). Jesus was very clear in this. We have heard how Saint Paul at the beginning tells the words of Jesus: "This is my body, this is my blood". "This is my blood, this is my body". It is Jesus himself who said this. We must not make strange thoughts: "But, how come something that ...". It is the body of Jesus; It's over there! Faith: faith comes to our aid; with an act of faith we believe that it is the body and the blood of Jesus. It is the "mystery of faith", as we say after the consecration. The priest says: "Mystery of faith" and we respond with an acclamation. Celebrating the memorial of the death and resurrection of the Lord, while awaiting his glorious return, the Church offers the Father the sacrifice that reconciles heaven and earth: he offers the paschal sacrifice of Christ, offering himself with him and asking, Sacrosanctum Concilium, 48; OGMR, 79 f). The Church wants to unite with Christ and become one body and one spirit with the Lord. This is the grace and fruit of sacramental Communion: we nourish ourselves with the Body of Christ to become, we who eat it, his living Body today in the world.
